





Each year, RHI impacts the lives of over 6,500 residents of Red Hook through an interconnected model of youth development, community building and local hiring.

Since our founding in 2002, RHI has prioritized the needs of this historically under-resourced community by confronting the impacts of racial inequity and decades of disinvestment. Our community of youth and families residing in Brooklyn's largest public housing complex faces disproportionate rates of health disparities, poverty and food insecurity. Despite living in a rapidly transforming neighborhood, residents of Red Hook public housing remain geographically isolated and poorly served by public transportation. The lack of local access to healthy, affordable produce has created public health crises including high rates of obesity, cardiovascular disease and diabetes.

Red Hook Farms works to increase access to fresh, affordable produce and nurture the next generation of green leaders. In late 2018, RHI assumed management of Added Value, one of Brooklyn's first and largest urban farms, and relaunched as Red Hook Farms — an innovative model for urban agriculture, youth development and community-led food production.





At Red Hook Initiative (RHI) we believe that social change to overcome systemic inequities begins with empowered youth. In partnership with community adults, we nurture young people in Red Hook to be inspired, resilient and healthy, and to envision themselves as co-creators of their lives, community and society.

Youth Farmers Program

On Red Hook Farms we hire, train and mentor teenagers from Red Hook in urban agriculture while cultivating their leadership, career and job readiness skills. The program offers three cycles aligning with the growing season: spring, summer and fall.

Last year, 21 youth farmers participated in all aspects of production from seed to sale. Youth farmers had an opportunity to:

- Learn and practice sustainable urban farming techniques
- Operate our weekly farm stands accessed by thousands of local residents
- Offer cooking demonstrations to support local culinary education
- Engage with peer organizations around food justice advocacy and collective learning

Farm Based Learning Program

Red Hook Farms serve as outdoor classrooms where children and youth roll up their sleeves, learn about plants and explore where their food comes from. Focusing on institutions that serve Red Hook youth, we host groups in the spring, summer and fall from schools, summer camps and local teen programs. Visits include a farm tour, plant exploration, service-learning activities and a farm-fresh snack.

Changing Local Health, Menus and Minds

In 2019, Red Hook Farms deepened its roots by reaching more local households than ever before.

24,412 pounds of produce harvested on two urban farms

63 households participated in our CSA

67 individuals accessed a weekly, low-cost Fresh Food Box

31 barter distributions served 1,908 NYCHA

residents

44 farm stands served 2,750 individuals

Red Hook Farms grows and harvests a variety of vegetables and herbs using organic and regenerative farming practices. This past season, our survey of over 200 Red Hook residents provided local input on our crops and improved our ability to serve Red Hook's under-resourced African American, Latinx and Asian communities. By offering multiple access points — through farm stands and memberships — we send produce into the kitchens of Red Hook families.

95% of our end-of-season survey respondents said the farm stands help them eat more fruits and vegetables.

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
